Europe 2006

I have been talking to a tour company about a possible Rhine Cruise for next year, and have the following details. The cost unfortunately is a little higher than we anticipated but you should bear in mind that this covers all meals and two days of excursions

Date: September 2006

5 nights full board

Day 1 Embarkation Cologne
Day 2 Cologne-Koblenz
Day 3 Koblenz-Cochem
Day 4 Cochem-Boppard

Day 5 Boppard -Ruedesheim or Andernach

Day 6 Homeward journey

Your vessel for the journey along the Rhine and Moselle is the Victoria Cruziana that has a total of 54 air-conditioned cabins. 23 cabins are on the Passenger (Lower) Deck and 31 cabins are on the Main (Upper) Deck. In order for you to have more time in Cologne we would propose that you have an early crossing from Dover to Calais to allow an arrival in Cologne at around 14.00 hours. The rest of the day and evening would then be free in the City and the ship moors very close to the Cathedral.

Insurance is available at a supplement of £19 per person if required.

The price quoted also includes coach transfers, return ferry, 2 excursions and the services of a Group UK tour manager.

The cost is £380. There is a small differential in cost between the two decks but at this stage I do not know what mix of cabins will be available to us so it will be first come (with a deposit of £50 per head) first served, subject to availability.

If you are interested I need to know ASAP, preferably no later than the July meeting night so that I can book the cabins. Contact me by telephone or email. **Deposits will be required** no later than the August meeting and will not be refundable.

A number of submissions of articles were made this month but I don't have room for them all. One covered a little history of the Hartz Mountain area that explains why all the tourist shops in Goslar were filled with witch dolls but it was clearly marked with copyright so I can't use it. Mike Brill spotted a story in the Telegraph about exploding toads in Hamburg, probably caused by a virus in the ponds they used for spawning. The last was from the Epping Forest Conservation volunteers newsletter, "Forest Leaves", about the threat posed to our native fish species caused by the introduction of the Korean Topmouth Gudgeon and the humble goldfish.

Topmouth Gudgeon Pseudorasbora parva (Temminck et Schlegel) Family: Cyprinidae

The Environment Agency has warned that Britain's native fish face an increasing threat from introduced alien species. Among the invaders is the topmouth gudgeon, a small Asian member of the carp family, which is widely sold in the ornamental fish trade and has been accidentally introduced to several British lakes. It out-competes native fish such as roach and rudd because it matures at one year old, whereas the native fish do not mature until the age of two or three. The common white sucker, an American species, has been found in Hertfordshire; experts say that it would occupy the same niche as barbel and chub, and compete with them for food and spawning areas. Another worrying arrival is the black bullhead, a voracious species that not only competes for food, but also devours the young of native fish. One of the most widespread problems is the release into British lakes and



rivers of the common goldfish. Research has revealed that the goldfish not only competes with Britain's only native carp species, the crucian carp, for food, but breeds with it, producing hybrids. A senior fisheries scientist said that there is a real threat that the crucian carp could be wiped out, especially as its habitat of reedy lakes is declining. Several of Epping Forest's ponds and lakes, such as Goldings Hill Pond, now contain goldfish; once in they are very difficult to remove. Anyone seeing fish being put into any Forest pond should report it immediately.
